Pastor's Page

"I tell you: love your enemies and pray for your persecutors.

This will prove that you are children of God.

For God makes the sun rise on bad and good alike;

God's rain falls on the just and the unjust."

--Jesus (Matthew 5:44-45, The Inclusive Bible)

Do you ever get depressed while listening to the news? Or do you ever just avoid the news because you want to avoid the bad stuff? Do you get angry about what's going on in the world, and you want to fix it but don't know how? Do you get upset about people who seem to be making things worse?

All this stuff happens to me. Often. I want to find some wisdom in Scripture, because isn't there peace in God's Word, somewhere? Isn't there justice, and victory over one's enemies, and righteousness through Jesus Christ? It sounds hopeful.

So there in Scripture, I find Jesus: preaching about loving one's enemies. And I roll my eyes. I don't wanna do that.

Jesus is really annoying because he just doesn't ever quit preaching about love. I always want to justify myself with all the reasons why I should be excused from this assignment, but my own justification is never going to be enough. And somewhere in between the lines of Jesus's words, I hear the echo of a question:

"Who do you want to be?"

You can't change someone else's behavior, but what about your own? How do you want to spend your precious time and energy? Would you rather live disconnected from reality because it's too painful, or do you want to live in this world with all its beauty and pain because God is present here?

Loving one's enemies starts to sound like a matter of setting priorities: if I don't want to nurture the hatred and anger in my heart, then I need to let that go, and that looks like love. And that doesn't mean I ignore what my enemies are doing; sometimes loving my enemies means holding them accountable for their actions. Accountability is a loving thing to do because it builds trust, even if it sometimes feels awkward at first.

Even after all the Valentine's Day hearts and chocolates and decorations have drifted away, what is the love which remains? What is the love worth fighting for, worth working toward, worth engaging?

The crucified and risen Christ waves his nail-scarred hand and says, "I can tell you all about it."



Throughout the season of Lent, beginning with the first weekend of Lent, we will be taking a brief moment to learn or perhaps renew our knowledge about why it is we do what we do in worship. By looking at disparate elements, we will be better able to see and understand the whole and perhaps feel able to enter more deeply into its grace.

The first week we will look at confession and forgiveness. Mercy will be viewed through the lens of our gratitude for baptism. During week two, a close examination of the gathering elements; gathering song, Kyrie, and Canticle of praise will offer us three related but different forms of sung response to ponder. The Word of God during week three will show us the primacy of psalmody and we will leave with a broader understanding of the Gospel Acclamation. What is an acclamation? How is it different? Why do we stand while singing it? The interplay between hearing and responding will be shown when we see how the Hymn of the Day and the Creed are placed side by side in worship during the fourth week. Finally, the last week we will look at the Agnus Dei, or Lamb of God and why it is placed where it is placed, as well the *Nunc Dimmitis*, or Post Communion Canticle. What is a canticle? How is it different than a hymn? Can't we just call everything a song?

In school, I can remember examining Bach chorales. Looking at each note, how it related to the other ones played simultaneously, and why it led to and came from where it did. We dove into the structure looking at ways the first four bars related to the last four bars. We saw how a theme was woven into the piece in one part, traveled to another, and was quoted it yet another. The tedium drove us first year theory students crazy. However, when all was said and done, listening to the piece gave such a fresh understanding, and we could hear how the parts interconnected with each other to form the whole and the end result was like a seamless garment...a nectar to our ears.

We care very much that our Worship Services give us Christ's grace, that we resonate with the Word, and that we're brought even closer to God's presence through our voicing of hymns and canticles. We care about the all. The big picture. That that is why we will afford ourselves the opportunity to pause and just ask ourselves why it is we do what we do. We pray it renews your love of our Worship Service!

If you attended church on Christmas day last year, you may have participated in a different Communion practice called intinction. In February, you will have the opportunity to learn more about this practice as the worship committee and church leadership consider this practice for distributing Communion during Lent. For a better understanding here is a brief explanation.

Intinction is the action of dipping the bread in the wine at a Eucharist, so that the communicant receives both together. We are considering this starting Ash Wednesday.

Why?

- more sanitary, as the bread will be larger and hands won't touch the wine
- environmentally friendly as in no more plastic cups
- aesthetically pleasing no more trash bins or plastic tables
- two cups: one wine, and one grape juice to accommodate needs and preferences
- ease of altar guild's already full responsibilities
- sacramentally sound. If you receive only bread you still receive all the grace of the sacrament.


